District Governor Eric Schmautz



Eric started Rotary in high school becoming an nteract president, and Rotarian in his senior year in Lake Seminole, Florida. He went to college in Denver and joined the University Park Rotary Club.

The San Francisco Rotary Club (SFRC) is the second Rotary club established after Rotary founder Paul Harris established the first one in Chicago in 1907. Paul Harris, who was raised in close knit New England, wanted to have similar close relationships in business in Chicago where the spirit of helpfulness, joy of service to mankind, and mutual fellowship would thrive.

Eric has participated in many Rotary International programs in countries such as Bangladesh, India, Sri-lanka, Thailand, and Cambodia involving programs for wheel chairs, pediatric vision and strabismus aid, as well as elementary school building.

He spoke of the project that he is working on with Rotary Club #2 in San Francisco and several other clubs on reducing malaria in and around Chipata, Zambia where 90% of 50,000 people in the target area get the disease; it is the highest cause of death in the country.

The local host Club is the Rotary Club of Chipata (Zambia) which is the founding member of the Zambia Rotary Malaria Steering Committee.

The project was undertaken in he 11 rural neighborhood communities in of Mabwe District's Masumba Zone. Indoor residual spraying also occur but this component was not funded by Rotary. Rotary supplied bed nets and supporting and training the Neighborhood Health Committees (NHC). The total project included :


- Strengthen the capacity of the communities to educate villagers and deliver services by the formation training and oversight of Neighborhood Health Committees (NHC) in each target area,
- (2) Purchase, distribute and promote the proper use of insecticide-treated bed nets (ITNs),
- (3) Encourage villagers to accept Indoor Residual Spraying, where appropriate, and
- (4) Identify all residents of Masumba Zone infected with the malaria parasite and treat them.

SunSpring Project, Thailand. July, 2013 update

In February 2013, the **H2OpenDoors** safe drinking water project was implemented with the goal being to provide safe and clean drinking water to the Huayjakan and Omkoi communities as they are faced with contaminated water that produces serious health effects. 5 months later a survey was carried out by Borderless Friendship Foundation (BFF) and RC Chiang Mai North Club, District 3360 RI to assess the impact the Sunspring systems have had on these communities and to highlight any necessary project developments. RC Chiang Mai North has been collaborating with BFF who have been closely monitoring the progress made by these communities.


Sunspring in Huayjakan community site.

Following the implementation of the Sunspring project, recently collected data by BFF suggests that the project has played a positive role in reducing water related health issues in the Huayjakan community. In February 2013, when the initial survey was carried out, it was found that the average person would experience 0.64 cases of diarrhea over a 2 week period with the elderly and very young being most susceptible (Figure 1). 6 months later a follow up survey has revealed that this figure has decreased to 0.16 cases over the same period with the most significant decreases occurring within the youngest and eldest age brackets (Figure 2). The number of minor issues being raised in the interviews, such as stomach aches or bladder pains, also noticeably decreased. Another key finding was that there had been a significant decrease in the number of people reliant on commercial water which can be attributed to the availability of safe and free drinking water. Figures 3 & 4 illustrate how the proportion of people not paying for safe drinking water has increased from 66% to 85%. However, this could also be due to the greater availability of non-commercial water during the rainy season as people are typically more likely to rely more on commercial water in times when there is a water shortage.





In early February, 2013, a SunSpring ultrafiltration water purification system was installed by H2OpenDoors at Huayjakan village in rural Northern Thailand. A Health Baseline Survey was conducted during that week to determine the various health levels of the 2500 hill tribe residents. That survey showed that there were 0.64 cases per person over the previous 2 weeks. Five months later, in mid-July, the second survey was conducted showing a decline of 75% to 0.16 cases per person over the previous two week period.














Basic Education High School, Tachilek Province, Myanmar

The primary water source for the school is one well without filtration, 4 meters deep (13 feet) for 2000 students and 40 teachers. H2OpenDoors will be installing a SunSpring ultrafiltration water system at this school in Burma in February 2014. The expedition will include students from our local high schools, as well as our partners in Rotary in Northern Thailand.

A well will be dug in front of building, and a SunSpring will be installed next to the well in February of 2014. This will provide up to 17,000 liters of safe drinking water every day for 10 years.
